HOW TO APPLY

Visit www.gwu.edu/~usfppsp to complete the application. Adobe Reader will prompt you to e-mail the completed application to usfppsp@gwu.edu. Supporting documents may also be submitted via e-mail. The application deadline is April 1 for the graduate/professional program and May 8 for the undergraduate program.

COSTS - 2012

The *estimated* tuition for the 3 credit program is \$3868 (undergraduate) or \$3896 (graduate/professionals), plus \$5 GW Student Fee and a \$155 Program Fee. Travel, lodging, meals and incidentals are the responsibility of each participant.

HOUSING & MEALS

Applicants may request on-campus housing in GW dormitories, centrally located in Washington, D.C. The estimated cost on-campus housing is \$491 per person for double occupancy rooms or \$836 for single occupancy rooms (15 nights). To extend housing prior to or after the program dates, please contact usfppsp@gwu.edu. Students are responsible for all meal costs. While no meal plans are offered at GW, there are on-campus eateries as well as many off campus restaurants and nearby grocery stores.

SCHEDULE

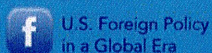
A typical day on the program may include:

- 14:00 GW faculty lecture: Worldviews of Aspiring Powers: Exploring Foreign Policy Debates Abroad

- 19:00 Group outing to Washington Nationals Baseball Game (optional)

Each day is different, but usually includes lectures by GW faculty, guest lecturers, and site visits to institutions around Washington, DC.

ABOUT THE LEAD PROFESSOR, DAVID BARTON

Professor Barton has thirty years of professional experience in national security and foreign policy, working with the United States Senate, United States House of Representatives, and the State Department. In 2002 he led an investigation team and developed the final report for the House and Senate Intelligence Committees on the terrorist events of September 11, 2001. From 2003 to 2005, Barton worked with the Senate Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs Committee. During 2006 and 2007, Barton directed a project at the National Academy of Public Administration focused on aspects of intelligence work and its relationship to the intelligence community and to state and local law enforcement. Barton brings a high level of practical insight to the course topics and his contacts in the area serve as great assets to the program.
