Chinese Language & Cultural Course 2nd – 19th January 2012

Course Overview

This Chinese language and cultural course consists of 2 parts covering Chinese language and Chinese cultural. It will be conducted over 3 weeks from 2^{nd} to 19^{th} January 2012, Mondays to Fridays 9.30am – 4.30pm in NTU campus. This course serves to equip the exchange students with basic Chinese language skills as well as exposure to the intriguing Chinese culture.

Course Description

Part 1 - This Chinese language course is designed for expatriates and non-Chinese who do not have any background on Chinese language. The course contents are topics-based to help you master basic conversational skills for day-to-day living. Basic reading and writing skills are also introduced to enhance the understanding of Chinese culture. Participants will be able to conduct basic conversations as well as learning how to write basic strokes, character components and single-component characters. Learn up to 200 Chinese characters, 40 grammatical points and 300 commonly-used sentences.

Part 2 - The Chinese cultural course aims to expose the exchange students to a few interesting Chinese culture such as Embracing the Dragon: An Overview of China, Numbers in Chinese and Festivals in China, Chinese calligraphy, Chinese Finger Painting, etc. Through the 3 weeks cultural course, the exchange students will be able to have a glimpse of the 5,000 year history of China as well as the Modern Chinese Celebrities and hands-on sessions on Chinese calligraphy, Chinese paper cutting, Chinese finger painting, and will also get to visit the Asian Civilisation Museum, Thian Hock Keng Temple and Chinatown, Sun Yat Sen Nanyang Memorial Hall, etc.
