in Guatemala

May 27th - July 20th, 2013

(May 27th – June 22nd online; June 23rd –July 20th in Guatemala)

"I just wanted to give you the great news that this past weekend the U21 students participated in our MOST successful village campaign since we started our work almost ten years ago. They supported a number of women entrepreneurs in the Jutiapa region and in one day served over 150 people and helped the women to sell 69 pairs of glasses, 35 eye drops, 30 packets of vegetable seeds, 8 solar lamps/cell phone chargers and one water purification bucket. Truly amazing! That amounts to hundreds of beneficiaries served in one day when you take into account the impact that these solutions have on families. > The Program

The U21 Social Entrepreneur Corps in Guatemala program builds on our U21 institutions' expertise in social entrepreneurship, online and blended learning, international collaboration and service learning, as well as on our common commitment to global citizenship.

Social entrepreneurship as a topic and Guatemala as a location are already part of individual U21 members' study abroad program offerings. The proposed U21 Social Entrepreneur Corps program is a tailored approach to study abroad that combines global collaboration, new technologies and impact-oriented learning activities.

Social entrepreneurship is an approach that the Social Entrepreneur Corps successfully utilizes in Latin America. For the proposed U21 program, students interested in international development will work

directly with Social Entrepreneur Corps field professionals and social entrepreneurs in Guatemala to help establish new and grow existing micro-consignment supported businesses.

The benefits include exposure to economic theories of social entrepreneurship and active engagement with case study analyses, Spanish language, and Guatemalan, including Mayan culture. The students will experience living with the local families and working intensively with community service organizations, and local social entrepreneurs. Our students will make a tangible difference in people's lives, while also acquiring the knowledge, skills, and habits necessary to become socially aware, active global citizens. The program is designed as a short-term summer (June/July) opportunity for U21 students. U21 students are encouraged, but not required to take this program for academic credit. This program aims to complement the already existing U21 Summer School and Global Issues Program.

> Program Structure

This program can be credit bearing, according to each university's policy. UConn will assign six credits to this program.

1. Pre-arrival: May 27 – June 22, 2013

The students will join a U21 Virtual Global Classroom, where they will learn about Social Entrepreneurship and Guatemalan Politics and Culture.

Participation in the pre-arrival phase is compulsory for the continuation of the program.

2. In-country Orientation and Foundation Building: June 23 – June 28, 2013

Upon arrival in the country, all students spend the first segment of their time in Xela (Quetzaltenango), participating in orientation sessions, living with local families, studying Spanish intensively, participating in development discussions, visiting nearby development and relief organizations and participating in project content and technical training.

3. Field Work: June 29 – July 14, 2013

Students travel back to Antigua and visit different satellite work sites, staying with additional local families, in group living settings and/or in hotels. Students will work with Peace Corps Volunteers, local community service organizations, and local businesses.

4. Conclusion, Delivery and Presentation: July 15 – July 20, 2013

All participants return to the Social Entrepreneur Corps headquarters site in Antigua for the final days of the program. At this time the projects are completed and presented, Spanish evaluations are conducted and participants stay with the local families one last time.

5. Assessment

Students will have to submit their final reports by **August 10, 2013**. All throughout the program, students will be invited to contribute to a group blog, sharing and reflecting on their experience. - Nomination process: Each U21 institution will be invited to submit one guaranteed and up to four ranked reserve student nominations.
- ➤ Application procedure: All nominated students (guaranteed and reserves) are invited to complete an online application through the University of Connecticut's study abroad application system, including a CV and a two-page essay detailing their motivation, experience and expectations in relation with the program.

> Working language: English. Knowledge of Spanish is helpful, but by no means mandatory.
